A Power Greater Than...Me?

I remember sitting in a room full of people and thinking to myself; what kind of shit are these losers on? They were taking about having help from their "Higher Power" and going on and on about finding serenity in surrender. I was force fed all that happy horseshit in rehab, I learned to just nod my head and smile, and hope for a way out of the loony bin. I was having a hard time relating to admitted quitters, people who just "gave up the fight". I wasn't like these people, I had will power, I could do anything I wanted, I just didn't want to. I was not a happy camper without dope, my whole world was shaking.

Things started changing for me when I finally came to a real Narcotics Anonymous meeting, it was different than the "meetings" I went to in rehab. In NA I met people who seemed to be happy, they were kind of at peace, and I could tell they had been down the same hard road as me. At first I wondered if they were really clean or if they had just found a way to use without all the consequences, either way I wanted to learn more about what was going on here.

I stuck it out long enough to find a sponsor and I worked on step one. I got a good dictionary and started looking up the meaning of words, words I thought I knew, but didn't. My sponsor also had me look up these two words "spiritual principles". I found out these words relate to a way of life, a sacred code of conduct. If I could somehow make a principle like honesty become sacred, so sacred to me that I would try my best make honesty a way of life. I had to try. All this honesty was taking a toll on me, I started to see what a mess my life was, and I could blame no one but myself.

When I got to the second step I struggled with the Higher Power concept, I wasn't sure if I wanted to get into all that. I still wanted to believe that I had the power to change my own life. I also had trouble asking for help, or even appearing to need any. I had to find out that self sufficiency was a lie. My brothers and sisters in the program were a big help, I saw them reaching out, asking other members for support when things got tough, and they weren't put down for it. I started thinking...this might just work...if I could open up my mind...I might have a chance...maybe. Finally some hope, all I had to do was allow it to be possible, my mind had been shut...locked up for so long...this feeling of hope feels so good. I want more...

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Perseverance in Recovery

Recovery is not always an easy task, and is not for the scared and timid. Recovery takes courage. Having true courage does not mean without fear, as I once thought. I have learned that courage is facing our fears, continuing on even when we are afraid.

I have heard it said many times, "staying clean is the easy part". It was not so easy for me when I first came to the fellowship. After being here for a few days, I began to understand what was meant by that saying.

Many times since I came to the rooms of Narcotics Anonymous, I have had to face the uncertainty of change. I was familiar with using, facing life while not using was frightening. I knew how to manipulate people to get my way, learning to trust the God of my understanding to help me through the rough spots took time. When I saw that my old survival skills were useless to me in recovery, I was afraid.

There have been times when I could not see where I was making any progress. I still acted out on my defects of character. I would try to run

on self will, or force things to be the way that I wanted them to be. These are the things that got me here in the first place. I began to see, if I was not willing to change, I would lose the gifts recovery had given me. I had to find a deeper level of surrender. I had to confront my fears of the unknown. Even though I had no idea what life would be like, I had to find the courage to give up, stop fighting, and let go.

Just for Today, that is how it works for this addict. When I finally realized that I could not change the outcome of tomorrow or undo what happened yesterday, I was able to live in the moment. When I do the next right thing, and leave the results up to my Higher Power, I have no reason to be afraid. I have found it easier to use the Spiritual Principles of NA, if I take life one moment at a time. I did not find out how this worked overnight, it took time, and I do not have all the answers, but thru perseverance, commitment, and courage I have made it this far.

TRADITION TWO

"For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority--a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants, they do not govern."

Working the NA program helps us to form a relationship with a Higher Power. As we come to rely on this Power, living according to spiritual principles becomes a reality for us. We develop a personal conscience and become trustworthy in out interactions with others.

No longer operating from fear, we attach less importance to getting our way. We become less controlling and more willing to cooperate. It becomes easier to share our feelings openly and honestly, while being receptive and respectful to those of others. We learn when to yield in a conflict, laying aside our differences for the common good.
